

What is Open Source License?

- Open source licenses are licenses that comply with the Open Source
 Definition in brief, they allow software to be freely used, modified,
 and shared.
- Popular Licenses: Apache License 2.0, GNU General Public License
 (GPL), MIT license, Mozilla Public License 2.0



Copyleft Vs Permissive License

- Copyleft is the practice of granting the right to freely distribute and modify intellectual property with the requirement that the same rights be preserved in derivative works created from that property.
- Under a copyleft license, users must copy, distribute, and change the software under the same license as the original software while permissive licenses does not have such restriction to use the same license.
- Example: GNU (Copyleft) and Apache 2.0 (Permissive)

Contributor License Agreement (CLA)

 A Contributor License Agreement (CLA) defines the terms under which intellectual property has been contributed to a company/project, typically software under an open source license.

At ASF we have:

ICLA: Individual Contributor License Agreement

CCLA: Corporate Contributor License Agreement



Software Grant Agreement (SGA)

- When an individual or corporation decides to donate a body of existing software or documentation to one of the Apache projects, they need to execute a formal <u>Software Grant Agreement (SGA)</u> with the ASF.
- Typically, this is done after negotiating approval with the ASF
 Incubator or one of the PMCs, since the ASF will not accept
 software unless there is a viable community available to support a
 collaborative project.
